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### **FOREWORD**

EMU 12th International Design Week (INTDW 2025) – themed, "In-Between: Architecture in Flux"

"In-Between: Architecture in Flux", offered a platform the collaborative and creative spirit cultivated by previous INTDW gatherings.

The central theme of INTDW 2025, "In-Between", aims to explore the changing and transitional nature of architecture, presenting it as a fluid entity situated between different states instead of a fixed end result. This theme urges participants to delve into the in-between stages of design, where spaces, structures, and environments are in a state of transition – between the past and the future, presence and abandonment, planning and realization, permanence and impermanence, as well as human and non-human influences. Rather than viewing stability as the ultimate goal, this theme pushes architects, urban planners, and designers to embrace uncertainty, flexibility, and transformation as vital design principles. It is anticipated that this theme will stimulate international discussions on the role of architects in adapting to unstable environments, designing for flexibility in uncertain futures, and reconceptualizing architecture as a dynamic rather than static field.

Followed with a sub-theme of "Architecture in Flux" the mainstream of INTDW 2025 will embrace



uncertainty by recognizing architecture and design as never finished, always adapting to cultural, social, environmental, and technological changes. This approach of INTDW 2025 theme will create room for innovation and experimentation while the "in-between" concept becomes a lens through which participants will explore architectural transitions and possibilities by responding to varieties of objectives.

Organized by the Faculty of Architecture, this program aims to foster interdisciplinary exchange and production within an international platform.

Scheduled to coincide with the academic calendar of the EMU Faculty of Architecture, this event occurs annually in May, with a specific conceptual framework guiding its organization. The EMU INT-DW spans four days and is offered free of charge. The program includes a variety of interdisciplinary workshops, seminars, presentations, and exhibitions tailored for students of art, design, and architecture. These activities are open not only to EMU Faculty of Architecture students but also to applicants from Famagusta, across Cyprus, and around the world.





## About EMU Faculty of Architecture



The Faculty of Architecture, which began its academic activities as a department of architecture under the Faculty of Engineering in 1991, was converted into a Faculty in 1997 with Departments of Architecture and Interior Architecture. Today beside these two undergraduate programs the faculty has 7 graduate programs and Doctoral Program of Architecture. The Faculty has a wide range of student and faculty member diversity. We held many events such as International Design Week, seminars, workshops and site visits all through the year. Involvement of our faculty members in professional and academic organizations marks a higher level in the academia and society. Our accreditations NAAB, MiAK, AQAS and memberships EAAE, ENHR, IFI as a Faculty are achieved by these constructive characteristics.

We try to contribute to students education by considering the international qualities, universal principles and targets in order to achieve creative and questioning individuals, who are aware of the technical, ethical, aesthetical, social, and cultural responsibilities of being an architect and interior architect.

### Theme: in between: architecture in flux



The theme "In-Between: Architecture in Flux" as a main theme of INT-DW 2025, intents to explore the evolving and transitional nature of architecture, positioning it as a fluid entity that exists between conditions rather than as a static end product. This theme invites participants to investigate the design's liminal states, where spaces, structures, and environments are caught between phases of transformation—between past and future, use and abandonment, design and realization, permanence and temporariness, human and non-human agency. Instead of seeing stability as an ideal, this theme challenges architects, urbanists, and designers to work with uncertainty, adaptability, and transformation as essential design principles. Logically, it is expected this theme to serve as a provocation for international discussions on the role of architects in responding to unstable environments, designing for adaptability in uncertain futures and rethinking architecture as a dynamic rather than static discipline.

Followed with a sub-theme of "Architecture in Flux" the mainstream of INTDW 2025 will embrace uncertainty by recognizing architecture and design as never finished, always adapting to cultural, social, environmental, and technological changes. This approach of INTDW 2025 theme will create room for innovation and experimentation while the "in-between" concept becomes a lens through which participants will explore architectural transitions and possibilities by responding to varieties of objectives.

In this quest, we will discuss conceptual relevance by exploring thresholds and Interfaces; Or we will emphasize the unfinished and the evolving by bridging the physical and the virtual. We will discuss practical applications and cultural-social dimensions, and open dialogues about the temporal, spatial, social and material flux as a key dimension of "In Between: Architecture in Flux".





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# KALEBODUR TALKS

### By Prof. Dr. Celal Abdi Güzer, Prof. Dr. Lale Özgenel, Alper Derinboğaz

**Prof. Dr. Celal Abdi Güzer** is currently a faculty member at the Department of Architecture at METU. He has won numerous awards and honors, including three first prizes. He is the founder of CAG Architecture Studio, which aims to create a research environment related to architecture and design, as well as to produce innovative projects.

**Prof. Dr. Lale Özgenel** is a professor at METU's Department of Architecture, specializing in housing history, rural architecture, and the history of tennis in Turkey. Educated at METU with postdoctoral research at Oxford, Athens, and Rome, she has worked on international archaeology projects, held leadership roles in academia

and professional organizations, and actively engages in architectural practice, teaching, and local governance as Vice President of the Ankara City Council since 2019.

Alper Derinboğaz is a Turkish architect and founder of Salon Alper Derinboğaz, named one of ArchDaily's Best Young Practices in 2020. A graduate of Istanbul Technical University and UCLA (Fulbright scholar), he represented Turkey at the 2014 Venice Architecture Biennale with Modalities of the Spontaneous, exploring Istanbul's urban transformation. Recognized among Europe's 40 Under 40 architects in 2019, he teaches architectural and urban design and has been widely published and invited to speak internationally.



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### **ISLAND SEEDS**



The Island Seeds collective sprouted from the local music scene promoted through the United by Sound program of the Home For Cooperation. In 2020, Island Seeds, a collective of almost 40 Cypriot musicians joined forces to record 'The Time Is Ripe', a special invitation to the world of united cooperation manifested. The result is a track sang in English, Cypriot-Greek and Cypriot-Turkish that drives the message home that no amount of divisive politics will stop the communities of Cyprus from re-uniting. The track was released by Home for Cooperation.

Building on the beautiful collaboration and synergy between the musicians, 8 Turkish-speaking and Greek-speaking Cypriot musicians continued their journey as the Island Seeds band. The band engaged in producing original songs in a collaborative process in 2021 and 2022, and presented them in their premiere performance on the 10(+1) Anniversary celebrations of the Home for Cooperation, in May 2022.


The band performed at the Fengaros Festival and the United by Sound Winter Edition series of the Home for Cooperation in 2022 & 2023.

# El Lissitzky's Proun Room - Living Thresholds: Re-imagining Shared Spaces In Flux

### By ISBE, Research Center for Interdisciplinary Studies in Built Environment

This workshop invites architecture students to re-create and reinterpret El Lissitzky's Prounenraum as a site-specific installation that explores the concept of "living thresholds". Based on existing archival material, prepared reconstruction drawings in scale based on available data, and online photographic documentation of the original work, students will design and construct spatial environments that closely reflect Lissitzky's vision. Inspired by Prounenraum's dynamic engagement with spatial in-betweenness, participants will develop transitional micro-spaces—zones that exist between permanence and temporariness, solitude and collectivity. Using reclaimed materials and ephemeral construction techniques, they will collaboratively produce spatial interventions that evoke movement, pause, and transformation. The outcome will be a series of experimental prototypes reflecting liminal architectural experiences grounded in contemporary campus life.

### Asking the Threshold: Exploring Future Housing through AI

### By HERA-C, Housing Education Research and Advisory Center

This workshop invites architecture and interior architecture students to reflect on, question, and creatively engage with Al-assisted design processes. Participants will explore how the concept of "threshold space/in between" in future housing might transform by asking only 20 carefully crafted questions to a language model like ChatGPT. The workshop emphasizes not only the design outcomes but also the questioning process itself—why and how each question is asked, and how the answers shape design thinking. Outputs include question-answer logbooks, diagrammatic sections, speculative spatial plans, and optionally Al-generated visuals. By the end, students are encouraged to critically examine human-machine collaboration, the balance between intuition and algorithm, and their own roles as designers. This experience reframes the design process as both a creative and reflective field of inquiry, pushing the boundaries of what it means to design with emerging technologies.



## Metaphors in Motion: CRAFTING DUALITY WITH PAPIER-MÂCHÉ

The workshop is designed to span three days, engaging participants in the exploration of duality and connection through the medium of papier-mâché. Its primary objective is to guide participants in the creation of a collaborative sculpture that embodies the theme of transitional spaces and relationships between contrasting concepts. The workshop will be structured to include conceptualization and armature creation on the first day, during which participants will brainstorm ideas related to the theme and construct the foundational armature using cardboard and wire. The second day will focus on the application of papier-mâché, with participants learning layering techniques and collaborating to experiment with various textures and forms. On the final day, participants will paint and embellish the completed sculpture, followed by presentations of their work and a group discussion to reflect upon their artistic journeys and the insights gained throughout the workshop.

#### By Furkan Canpolat from Celal Bayar University



### Can AI Feel? Spatial Interpretations through Human-AI Collaboration



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











